Curbside Trash Collection:

Trash collection is scheduled for Tuesday each week. Residents can place up to 5- 35 gal. trash cans or bags, not to exceed 60 lbs., for collection prior to 5:30 am on vour service day.

Curbside Recycling Collection:

Recycle collection will occur every other week on Tuesday depending on where you live within the borough.

Refer to map detailing your scheduled collection week. GREEN: Recycling collection East of 4th Street. YELLOW: Recycling collection West of 4th Street (including residents on both sides of 4th St.). BLUE: Bangor Borough Leaf Collection

Your waste will be collected curbside each Tuesday except after Memorial Day, Fourth of July and Labor Day when collections will occur on Wednesday.

Please call 1-800-621-2100 to reach our Grand Central Landfill and Hauling Team with any questions.

Waste Management will not collect yard waste, grass, televisions, computer equipment, appliances containing refrigerants, construction debris and hazardous waste. Our company also will not collect any liquid waste, including paint. If you have paint you no longer need, attempt to give it to someone who can use it. Otherwise, before placing out for the trash collection allow the paint to dry out or add cat litter or sand to the paint so that is no longer liquid.

Single Stream Recycling Collection

All recyclables may be placed in the same recycling container and put out for collection every other Tuesday. Please NO PLASTIC BAGS.

What Bangor Borough Can Recycle

These items may be placed in the container for single-stream recycling

- Plastics: 1-7
- Glass: bottles and jars
- Metal: bi-metal, aluminum or tin cans
- Paper: newsprint, small cardboard boxes (shoe, gift, cereal boxes), magazines, phone books, envelopes, junk
- Cartons: Milk, cream, wine, juice, broth, egg substitutes
- Corrugated cardboard: please cut or flatten boxes

These items are not accepted for recycling

- Plastics: toys, garden hoses, pool covers, bowling balls, clam-shell containers (think tomato and fruit containers)
- Glass: mirrors, plate glass, drinking glasses, glass cookware
- Electronics: TV's, microwave ovens, appliances
- Styrofoam, propane tanks, tires
- Any soiled or greasy paper or cardboard, including pizza boxes
- Used Syringes please use our Think Green from Home program for this

YARD WASTE RECYCLING

A year round drop off container is located at Bangor Memorial Park for leaves, branches (1-1/2" in diameter & 3' long) and shrubbery. All leaf/yard waste must be contained in brown bio-degradable bags and are available for purchase at your local hardware store.

No plastic bags will be accepted. Christmas trees must be free of tinsel, ornaments and lights.

CURBSIDE LEAF COLLECTION:

November 1st to November 22nd

Please rake all leaves to the curb. The Public Works Department will not empty bags or other containers; this is the responsibility of the resident. Branches, shrubbery, finely mulched leaves, grass, garbage, pet waste and other building materials will not be picked up.

Leaves will not be collected from private property. Please place leaves curbside to ensure proper pickup.

Do not place pieces of wood, steel, rocks, or concrete on the leaves to hold them down. These objects will cause damage to the leaf pickup units and put them out of service at a great expense of time and money to the Borough and its residents.

To help facilitate the picking up of the leaves, please keep all vehicles away from the area where the leaves are piled. The Public Works Department will not rake piles of leaves out from between parked cars or from under them.



YARD WASTE RECYCLING:

A year round drop off container is located at Bangor Memorial Park for leaves, branches, (1-1/2" in diameter and 3' long) and shrubbery. All leaf/yard waste must be contained in brown biodegradable bags which are available for purchase at your local hardware store. No plastic bags will be accepted.

The yard waste dumpsters have been restored with revised hours to help prevent illegal dumping (Wednesdays from 8 am through Fridays at 2pm). The dumpsters will have to be removed again if illegal use/dumping continues: NO GRASS, DIRT, BAGS, TRASH OR OTHER DEBRIS ALLOWED.



MESSAGE FROM THE STREET DEPARTMENT

Every winter storm our crews work around the clock to clear the snow and ice. The Borough first plows major streets for emergency vehicle passage as the highest priority. After that, clearing side streets is the next priority. Once all the streets are passable, crews then work on cleaning snow from intersections and parking spaces.

We know that residents hate the "windrows" (those long piles of snow on each side of the road) that plows leave behind, and that often bury freshly shoveled sidewalks and driveway aprons. Unfortunately, the reality is that these "windrows" are an unavoidable part of plowing. You can reduce the amount of snow that ends up in a "windrow" in front of your driveway or walk by doing certain things:

- **DO NOT** push snow from your walk, drive, or parking area out into the street as it will only be pushed back in when the plow passes
- When you clear snow, also clear the snow from the road shoulder about 15 feet "upstream" of plow traffic direction (the direction the plow comes from). This way, when the plow passes by, less snow will be pushed back into your driveway.
- Clear all of your sidewalks, the full width of the sidewalk, down to the bare pavement.
- After the sidewalk is cleared, **sprinkling a little sand** can help keep the sidewalk from becoming slippery as night falls and temperatures drop.
- Pile the snow you clear in your yard.
- If you have a corner property, clear curb cuts at corners and crosswalks to the street gutter to create a safe passageway.
- Don't wait to clear the snow—the longer you wait the harder it becomes to move it because it melts and refreezes in an ice cover.
- If you will be away on vacation or health issues prevent you from clearing your sidewalk, **make arrangements for help** before the snowfall season.
- Business owners should clear the sidewalk and attempt to provide a walkway from the street to allow customers using street parking to get safely to the sidewalk without climbing over snow banks.
- PLEASE, be patient and courteous to crews!!!!

WHEN THE SNOW MELTS...

Storm water on parking lots and streets flows into storm drains so that the pavement won't be flooded. Storm drains connect to underground pipes that convey the storm water directly to a nearby water body. In order to prevent storm water pollution please properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint – never pour them in any storm drain of any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone who does.

MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE CHIEF

In Case of Fire---Try Not To Panic!!

- Open doors carefully, only after feeling them to see if they are hot. Stay close to the floor as smoke and hot gases rise. Breathe through a cloth and take short, shallow breaths. Follow your pre-planned escape route. Remember, being prepared could save your life and those you love!
- Fall is upon us and with colder weather coming we close our windows and turn on our heat. Now is the time to have your furnace serviced to avoid any problems over the winter.



- If you have a fireplace or wood stove, you should get your chimney cleaned on a regular basis.
- Also important now that the windows are closing is to make sure to have a working Carbon Monoxide detector. Carbon Monoxide is a by-product of incomplete combustion of natural gas, propane, gasoline, coal, oil, kerosene, or wood. Did you know you can get carbon monoxide from automobiles, unvented appliances such as an oven, space heater, stove, barbeque grill and gasoline engines as well as ventilated appliances such as your furnace, gas dryer, hot water heater, and fire place?

If your Carbon Monoxide detector alarms, you should get everyone out of the house immediately and call 911. Do not open windows or doors to let in fresh air, the Fire Department has special instruments that can detect Carbon Monoxide and we need your home to be kept closed until our arrival.

IT HAS BEEN MY ABSOLUTE HONOR TO REPRESENT YOU

Earlier this summer, I opened a district office in Bangor at 20 Market Street to serve the residents of the Slate Belt. It is opened Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 am – 5 pm. From PennDOT (driver's licenses, vehicle registrations, parking placards) to Property Tax Rent Rebates to Birth Certificates to Unemployment Compensation issues, we are here to help! One issue that I will continue to fight for is the need to reduce our reliance on local property taxes as the primary source for funding public education. Unfortunately, the recently signed state budget failed to address this need. Pennsylvania homeowners remain overtaxed and too many school districts are short- changed by our continued use of this antiquated, unfair, and unconstitutional system.

It is hardworking homeowners that are footing the bill for public education. Even worse, the bulk of that is on a select group of property owners due to a provision in the law known as "hold harmless."

This law enacted in 1992 ensured that no school district would receive less funding than it did the year prior, even when its student population declined. So, in school districts where student enrollment decreased, their per-pupil state funding continued to grow. Whereas the school districts where the population grew never received enough funding to cover their growing costs. As a result, many school districts regularly raised local property taxes to make up for the state's failure to provide needed funds.

When combining both local and state funding, Pennsylvanians pump a lot of money into public education. A 2023 report put out by World Population Review noted that Pennsylvania ranked 8th in terms of per-pupil spending. However, a 2022 WalletHub report found that Pennsylvania ranked near the bottom for the equitable distribution of its education funds. Do you know why? Only one-third of the total education spend comes from the Commonwealth, while the remaining dollars come virtually all from local school property taxes.

Although the inequity of our system has been well-known for decades, there is now a court order mandating a fix to our funding system. While the Court left it to the General Assembly and the Governor to craft a solution, the decision made clear that our overreliance on local property taxes combined with the "hold harmless" provision is at the root of the problem. Knowing about the unfairness of the system, the harm it has caused to homeowners for decades and the existence of a court order, what did Harrisburg leaders do about local school property taxes? Absolutely Nothing. Instead, they championed pet projects that that do nothing to alleviate the crushing burden of school property taxes or fix the inequities in the system. Programs like free school breakfasts, school vouchers, increased Educational Improvement Tax Credits and more level-up funding are mere band-aids that fail to address the structural problems with our school funding system.

Some officials will point to the expansion of the property tax and rent rebate program to demonstrate that they are serious about addressing the school property tax problem. Do not be fooled. The expanded program is projected to help about 10% of homeowners. Last year 277,000 homeowners benefitted from this program. The expansion might help another 100,000. Today, there are over 3.4 million homeowners in Pennsylvania and an additional 52,000 farmsteads, which means 90% of homeowners get no benefit. The reality is homeowners are left holding the bag again. They are forced to cough up more in property taxes as they watch the state ignore the fair funding formula, overpay for cyber charter schools, and continue the application of a law that punishes property owners in growing school districts.

Band-aid approaches to education funding and "property tax relief" have made things worse and need to be replaced with real change. That means both chambers, both parties, and the Governor need to sit down at the table and find a better mechanism to fund our schools. Hard working homeowners across Pennsylvania deserve the relief that comes with a total overhaul to the system.

The annual budget dance demonstrates that the only thing that motivates Harrisburg is a real deadline. It is why a Constitutional Amendment ending property taxes for homeowners by a specific date and requiring the legislature to fix the broken system is the only way to hold Harrisburg leaders accountable. Twice this session, I offered such an amendment calling for ending property taxes for homeowners and farmsteads by 2028 and requiring the General Assembly to come up with replacement revenues. Both times, leaders moved to avoid a vote on the merits in a calculated move to prevent the amendment from getting to the voters.

Real property tax reform is needed now. It is time for homeowners to step forward and make clear to their elected representatives to make property tax reform – a "pet project" and hold them accountable. Demand a vote on setting a firm deadline to end our reliance on local property taxes and create a fairer funding system by a date certain. Without homeowners raising their voices and demanding accountability, Harrisburg will continue to pay lip service to this long-standing problem but offer little in the way of real solutions.

The BPD is staffed by the Chief, 5 full time patrol officers and 2 part-time patrol officers. Each officer is involved in all aspects of modern law enforcement including, but not limited to: crime deterrence, investigation of criminal activity, apprehension and prosecution of criminal offenders. investigation of motor vehicle accidents. and the enforcement of Pennsylvania's criminal and traffic laws.

In addition to the basic law enforcement duties described above, some officers participate in specialized assignments such as the inter-departmental Special Response Team, Motor Carrier Enforcement, Accident Reconstruction, and the Northampton County Drug Task Force.

Patrol Division

Patrol is the backbone of any police department. The Bangor Borough Police Department runs a very aggressive patrol program. An aggressive patrol program results in higher crime deterrence, the discovery of in-progress criminal activity, and a higher rate of criminal offender apprehension. Ultimately, this leads to a lower crime rate and a better quality of life within the borough. All police officers in the BPD perform duties in the Patrol Division. The Patrol Division utilizes 4 marked police cars.

The vast majority of citizen contacts with the BPD are a result of a patrol function, be it responding to a call for service, a traffic stop, or investigating motor vehicle accidents. As such, Patrol is the most highly visible portion of the BPD and the most easily recognized.

Each officer on duty is responsible for patrolling the entire borough, and responding to any and all emergencies or calls for service, as well as assisting neighboring police departments when requested.
